

State Funding and Local Taxes


In 2011, Governor Corbett cut \$1 billion from state education funding and dismantled the funding formula, making Pennsylvania one of only 3 states that do not use a formula.

Now, school districts are receiving less state funding.

With the amount of state aid received for the 2013-14 academic year, Upper Darby School District is still more than \$8 million away from 2013-14 adequacy targets.



To cope with state budget cuts, the burden of funding schools has fallen on local communities. During the past three years, many school districts have raised property taxes at least once.



Upper Darby has raised property taxes by almost 10% in the past three years, the 3rd highest increase in Delaware County.

Student Performance Facts

- *Upper Darby School District is one of 5 school districts in Delaware County that had fewer than 70% of students perform at grade level in both reading and math in 2012.
- * In Upper Darby, economically disadvantaged students scored almost 10 percentage points fewer than average in math, and black students scored nearly 20 percentage points fewer.
- * Upper Darby graduates about 85% of its students, the 6th lowest rate in Delaware County.

What does the future hold for Upper Darby School District?

The Governor's 2014-15 budget proposal calls for \$241 million to restore funding for Pennsylvania's schools, most of which will be available through the newly created *Ready to Learn Block Grant*. If the Governor's proposal is adopted by legislature, next year districts will be \$440 million short in state funds compared to 2010-11 funding levels.

The Upper Darby School District has received politically motivated funding supplements in recent years. With the Governor's proposed *Ready to Learn Block Grant* for the 2014-15 academic year, the Upper Darby School District will continue to be funded above 2010-11 funding levels. While this has obviously been beneficial for Upper Darby, the money has not been distributed based on a fair funding formula, and so there is no guarantee that this funding will continue.
