
State Funding and Local Taxes

In 2011, Governor Corbett cut \$1 billion from state education funding and dismantled the funding formula, making Pennsylvania one of only 3 states that do not use a formula.


Now, school districts are receiving less state funding.

With the amount of state aid received for the 2013-14 academic year, William Penn School District is still:

- ◆ More than \$7 million away from 2013-14 adequacy targets.
- ◆ More than \$2 million away from 2010-2011 funding levels.



To cope with state budget cuts, the burden of funding schools has fallen on local communities. During the past three years, many school districts have raised property taxes at least once.



William Penn has increased property taxes 2% in the last three years, the second lowest increase in Delaware County.

Student Performance Facts


- * William Penn graduates about 75% of students, and is one of 4 school districts in Delaware County with a graduation rate lower than the state average of 83%.
- * Both economically disadvantaged and black student groups score within 5 percentage points of the average student math score in William Penn School District, indicating a minimal achievement gap.
- *Fewer than 55% of William Penn students scored at or above grade level in both reading and math in 2012, the second lowest rate in Delaware County.

What does the future hold for William Penn School District?

The Governor's 2014-15 budget proposal calls for \$241 million to restore funding for Pennsylvania's schools, most of which will be available through the newly created Ready to Learn Block Grant. If the Governor's proposal is adopted by legislature, next year districts will be \$440 million short in state funds compared to 2010-11 funding levels.

Even with the Governor's proposed *Ready to Learn Block Grant* for the 2014-15 academic year, the William Penn School District will be more than \$1.6 million short in state aid compared to 2010-11 funding levels.
