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

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NEW: Student Advocacy for the Arts

ART ADVOCACY BOOKS

At **Harrison**, students compiled their work into a photo book, to send to area legislators. Students also submitted work to the Artistic Rebuttal project--a collection of text and images describing the importance of art to individuals, artists, and communities.

MEDIA COVERAGE

At **Mifflin** and **Cleveland**, student work received newspaper coverage, while those from **Robeson** and **Powel** took to the airwaves to record radio interviews with students and teachers. **Greenfield** youth recorded a podcast about their school's project and **Jackson** students were featured on an ABC News broadcast highlighting community arts.

STUDENT-LED PANELS

Sankofa students hosted two film screenings of their video project and a panel discussion about the importance of the arts in their lives, school, and community.

SRC TESTIMONY

Two **Excel** students testified before the School Reform Commission, urging Commissioners to support continued funding for arts curricula in schools. A representative from Action Harvest, the community organization partnering with **Houston** School, also testified about the arts' positive impact on students and communities.









Projects At-A-Glance

A PEACEABLE KINGDOM-BUILDING COMMMUNITY Cassidy

To begin to create a peaceful and safe learning environment, students read books and then created their own on the subject of conflict and peace for the school library. Students created a mosaic mural for the lunchroom/gym while working with the mosaic tile mural artist, Esther Cohen-Eskin and a WePac volunteer.

SYMBOLIC SELF-PORTRAITS Harrison

Students developed mixed media self portraits and personal artist statements, guided by local artists Nikki Virbitsky, Ron Wandering Feather and Raphael Fenton-Spaid. Harrison's grant was particularly poignant, as their school closed its doors in June. The infusion of an exciting arts project provided a necessary, positive experience students will carry with them from their Harrison School experience.

FROM THESE ROOTS Robeson

In collaboration with teaching artist Issac Maefield and West Philadelphia Cultural Alliance's Paul Robeson House, 50 ninth and twelfth grade students explored the history of the internationally known, singer, artist, actor and advocate Paul Robeson, as well as other influential African Americans. Students created works of clay and designed large scale, permanent display panels about Paul Robeson which were shown at the school.

100 GRANTS!

As a new pilot project to increase sustainability of arts programming, six schools received funds to extend their 2012 projects in the fall.

Picasso has now funded over **100** schools in **10** years.
