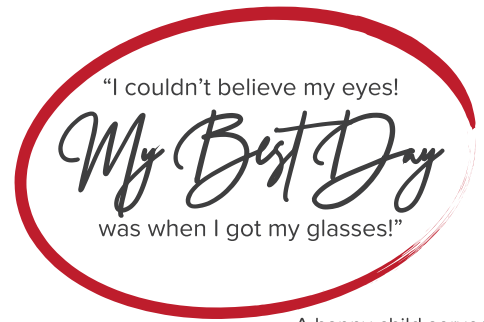

# DEMANDING HEALTH CARE FOR ALL CHILDREN

December 2, 2018



For many of the 650 children who received two free pairs of glasses on Give Kids Sight Day, it was the first time viewing the world without blurred vision. That's a lot of best days.

In all, 1,200 children received a free vision screening at our annual day of free vision care, exceeding last year's number by 200 children. In Southeastern Pennsylvania, 36,000 children are uninsured and events like Give Kids Sight Day and its sister event Give Kids a Smile for dental care demonstrate the urgent need to make sure all children have access to health insurance.

Thankfully, 864 children received free dental care, an increase of 33% compared to last year. Shockingly, a quarter of the children who saw a dentist had cavities in four or more teeth!

For these kids and others, we help their parents navigate the complicated process of enrolling in public health insurance. This year, 316 children were insured for the first time and another 583 families received the expert assistance they needed to resolve complicated insurance problems affecting their child's health.

That's nearly 3,000 kids who are healthier thanks to PCCY.

While we meet the immediate health care needs of children, we also fight to remove the barriers that make health care out of reach entirely for more than 20,000 children. PCCY's Dream Care Coalition is working to change that, with more than 100 partners, including insurers, health care systems, public health organizations and allies of immigrant children. An impressive and strongly bi-partisan group of state lawmakers now shares our belief that these children must be able to enroll in CHIP. These lawmakers will be working side-by-side with PCCY to make that happen in the next legislative session.

# PUSHING FOR SCHOOLS THAT WORK FOR EVERY CHILD

Chronic underfunding of public schools remains the greatest failing of state legislators who shrug off their constitutional duty to provide the approximately 540,000 students in Southeast Pennsylvania with a thorough and efficient education system.

Our statewide partners depend on PCCY to recruit and engage citizens from the most powerful region in the state to lend their voice to campaign to end Pennsylvania's school funding crisis. PCCY organized trainings and press conferences across the region and arranged for dozens of delegations of education supporters to meet with lawmakers in Harrisburg to make the case for more funds for schools. Our work paid off; this year's state budget included \$100M in new funding that flowed through PA's Fair Funding formula.

Parents, school leaders and lawmakers depend on PCCY's deep understanding of what it takes for schools to succeed to back up our push for school funding. Our latest reports, [Expanding High Quality Charter School Options](#) and [Uncharted Territory](#) examined how the Commonwealth's widely ridiculed charter school law does little to improve the quality of education and raised the alarm on the rising costs and inefficiencies of charter school funding as enrollment increases.

We know that publishing a report alone cannot move the needle on policy. That's why PCCY actively unified many public and charter school allies behind our Checklist for a Stronger Charter School Law and persuaded dozens of lawmakers that a state law devoid of Checklist elements isn't worthy of enactment.

## ADDRESSING THE TOXIC LEGACY OF LEAD PAINT

Gut-wrenching headlines from the *Philadelphia Inquirer's* "Toxic City" series painted a bleak picture of toxic lead dangers for children. Long before that story, PCCY led the charge to rid our homes of lead paint. This year we stepped to the plate once more.

PCCY organized months of productive meetings with the city and state health agencies, urging a more robust focus on ridding Philadelphia's homes of lead paint and lead dust. To add muscle to our push, PCCY convened the first Philadelphia Lead Poisoning Summit. Wasting no time at the summit, PCCY founded the Lead Free Philly Coalition.

Already, the Coalition has drafted legislation and succeeded in getting it proposed for a vote in City Council. By all indications, our approach is working and we expect to see the new legislation we need within 12 months of forming the Coalition.

# PROTECTING THE POSSIBILITY OF PRE-K FOR ALL

## PRE-K FOR PA

The nation may be divided over a number of issues, but increasing access to quality pre-k for 3- and 4-year-olds isn't one of them.

Every year PCCY staff, backed by our network of educators and parents, meet with state legislators during budget season, arrange visits by lawmakers to local pre-k centers and place op-eds in community newspapers. While the work is rigorous and robust, the degree to which the years-long campaign has succeeded to educate voters was stunning nonetheless. This year's state budget saw \$25M more for high-quality pre-k programs.

In 2016 PCCY led the community-driven campaign that secured funding via the Sweetened Beverage Tax (a.k.a. Soda Tax) for a massive expansion of quality pre-k seats and desperately needed repairs to libraries, playgrounds and recreation centers.

But as this year's state budget was being debated, Philadelphia's pre-k funding came under attack.

PCCY wasted no time galvanizing grassroots support to defend these crucial investments from a punitive and wasteful lawsuit from the beverage industry and their effort to use the brute power of the legislature to end the inspired Philadelphia pre-k funding.

True to our belief that we must use every tool available to fight for kids, PCCY filed an Amicus Brief in Commonwealth Court to protect Philadelphia's Sweetened Beverage Tax. We also never took our sights off Harrisburg where petty efforts aimed at repealing the locally enacted tax for pre-k were gathering steam.

Fortunately, the court victory and PCCY's vigilance in Harrisburg helped preserve 5,500 high-quality pre-k seats, as well as the funds for badly needed repairs to the city's playgrounds, libraries and recreation centers.

Research shows that the most formative years for a child are those between zero and three. That's why this year we assembled 50 partners in a statewide coalition to develop a strategy to take advantage of the most important years of development.

Though in its infancy, the strategy and coalition are already showing promise. The State has begun to find ways to find new funds for infant/toddler care and the Governor empaneled an Infant/Toddler Task Force to review our strategy and make recommendations for action.

## UNLEASHING THE POWER OF ARTS IN OUR SCHOOLS

PCCY's Picasso Project makes very special things happen in our schools. The Alexander McClure Elementary's mural mosaic was five years in the making in response to an incidence of violence, created by successive classes of 5th graders. This year, McClure was one of 14 Philadelphia public schools that received PCCY's strategic arts mini-grants aimed at providing innovative arts opportunities to students at under-resourced schools.

In this, Picasso Project's 15<sup>th</sup> year operating as one of the District's largest funders of arts education, we awarded \$65,000 in strategic grants.

Our grants cannot solve the dearth of arts programming in our schools, but advocacy can. As the leading voice for expanded arts education, PCCY is seeing real change. This school year is the first time in many years that every District school has at least one arts teacher and every elementary school has an instrumental music program. While that's hardly enough, it indicates that opportunities in the arts are now recognized as a crucial part of learning.

# PRESSING FOR BETTER SYSTEMS THAT CARE FOR THE MOST VULNERABLE CHILDREN

## CHILD WELFARE

Around 900 Philadelphia children and youth live in institutional facilities far outside city limits, sometimes facing dangerous conditions and little access to education and healing supports they need to return home. Shocking media reports, including video footage of a teen brutalized by staff of a residential facility, followed the tragic choking death (ruled a homicide) of David Hess at the now shuttered Woodsworth Academy by a member of its staff.

These stories and dozens like them spurred PCCY to become a leading member of a coalition of children's advocates that is demanding change to protect and care for the most vulnerable children in the city.

Armed with new analysis crystalizing the consequences of the low accountability and poor transparency of residential institutions, and after numerous discussions with the City's Human Services commissioner and other key officials in local and state government, PCCY worked with City Council who unanimously voted to create a Youth Residential Placement Task Force. Now, the hard work of far-reaching reform of the residential settings begins and PCCY and our partner child advocates are at the table.

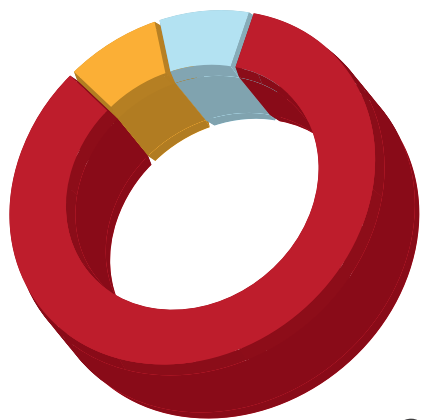

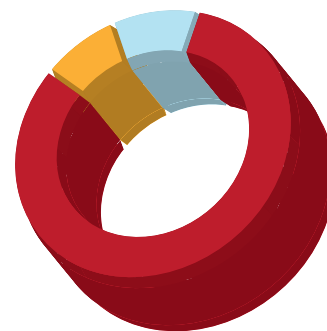
