

When children and families faced insurmountable risks triggered by COVID, Children First removed barriers, built new platforms, and preserved elements of the opportunity infrastructure for children.

In 2021, we:

- Designed the Equity Principles to Improve Public School Capacity
- Preserved the Early Learning System
- Built the Grid to End Childhood Lead Poisoning
- Added a Layer of Protection for Children Living in Institutions
- Reinforced Public Education





the Equity Principles to Improve Public School Capacity

The suburban public school infrastructure in southeastern Pennsylvania is serving more diverse students and more students from low-income families than ever before. These once homogeneous school districts are showing early warning signs of growing inequity.

Children First published the groundbreaking examination of racial disparity in suburban Philadelphia school districts, *No More Dreams Deferred*, which helped galvanize school leaders, parents, and students. They embraced and built on our proposed principles for school equity and are creating actionable plans to address the systemic barriers to success for students of color.

Through our efforts, school leaders from more than a dozen suburban districts are putting equity principles in place to create access to rigorous, inspiriting, learning environments for students of color and improve the learning experience for every student.

"After almost a year of research that uncovered and documented deep equity challenges in suburban school districts, we are now having real and very deep discussions about equity in these districts with students, parents, and educational leaders.

These tough conversations are made even tougher because of the hyper-partisan environment where Critical Race Theory is being used to divide communities. Nevertheless, we are undaunted. With our partners, we will continue to hold schools accountable and ensure they dismantle policies that undermine the success of students of color.

Rhetorical battles may make the front page news, but we are doing the hard work behind the scenes to improve educational equity for thousands of students by ensuring these students can attend rigorous classes and schools where they are welcome and valued.



The building blocks of learning and life for most children depend on a system of publicly supported early learning programs that nurture the development of Black, Hispanic, and low-income children while their parents are working.

COVID buckled the foundation of this system as hundreds of programs closed and classes for young children were shuttered.

Children First, together with partners across the state, persuaded state lawmakers to adopt our plan of \$130 million in emergency financial supports to undergird the early learning system throughout the crisis.

Our plan represented the largest use of discretionary American Rescue Plan resources designated by state lawmakers.

With these supports, and those also allocated by Congress, 85% of all early learning programs were able to remain open, making it possible for this critical element of our child raising infrastructure to continue to nurture child development and the gainful employment of parents.

From the childhood lead poisoning hot spots of Delaware and Montgomery counties to the most toxic blocks in Philadelphia, we've expanded access to lead poisoning screening and lead paint remediation, and spurred aggressive, new code enforcement practices. These are the components of remediating lead from our housing infrastructure.

The local commitment to lead free homes took hold in 2021. Enforcement of the sweeping Philadelphia Lead Ordinance we helped enact in 2019 was rolled out to the most toxic neighborhoods causing landlords to guarantee their apartments are safe for children. Norristown City Council enacted an even more aggressive bill to protect children in their city. And municipal leaders in Delaware County built their capacity to crack down on housing code violations associated with exposing children to lead paint.

We also set our sights on statewide protections and built a strong framework, which unites advocates and agencies to end childhood lead poisoning called the Pennsylvania Lead-Free Promise Project. Together, 47 rural, suburban, and urban organizations are working together to build support for new state protections and resources so that, in the near future, no child in Pennsylvania tests positive for lead poisoning.

The tragic accounts of children being abused behind the walls of institutions continue to make headlines from Glen Mills to MidAtlantic to Devereaux and Wordsworth. These programs intended for the care of the most vulnerable children continue to fail them. They continue to put children of color and children from low-income families at grave risk.

Our Philadelphia youth safety coalition successfully created a safety valve for these children by persuading Philadelphia City Council to fund the first Youth Ombudspersons Office in the state. Philadelphia City Council stepped forward because we made sure they heard from parents, youth, and whistleblowers that the system of protection for these children needed reinforcement.

This new office, poised to open in 2022, will be independent of the child welfare agencies and charged with investigating institutional abuse when children fear for their safety. Because nearly half of the children detained in institutions across the state are from Philadelphia, this new layer of protection has the potential to safeguard children, who are institutionalized, from harm, statewide.

Public Education

Every aspect of our community, economy, and civic life depends on the infrastructure of public schools, which are charged with preparing the next generation for their time to lead. For children of color and children in low-income households to be prepared for that challenge, the schools that educate them must be improved – requiring significant reinforcement of resources and supports.

COVID created a unique opportunity to make the case for the public schools that have the fewest resources and that educate students from the lowest income families.

We struck while the iron was hot and shaped a new tool to get funds to the state's 100 poorest school districts. With partners, we created the Level Up Coalition that paved the way for \$100 million in new state funding for the districts that need it the most.

This doesn't solve the state's school funding crisis, but Level Up hastened the pace of closing the equity gap among school districts in Pennsylvania.

"With many of our partners from the PA Schools Work Campaign we constructed a novel new method of getting more state funding to the districts that need it most -- without negatively affecting the Fair School Funding Formula we helped get enacted in 2015.

We called the campaign Level Up because our approach accelerated the pace of increasing state resources to the lowest spending, neediest school districts.



After just four months, we secured support from a majority of lawmakers on both sides of the aisle for our proposal. We were pleasantly surprised and inspired and became determined to do more of the same next year."
